

THEY



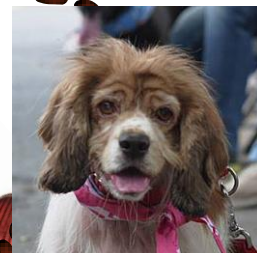

Spotted with a jar over her head three days before capture by animal control, **Emily**, a very recent mother, was emaciated, dehydrated, and terrified. Mutts picked her up in NC one hour before she was to be put down. Her adoptive parents adore her.



His identical brothers were swooped up right away but for no reason we could see, **Jake** had to wait a long time. His besotted adopters are making sure their family was worth his wait.



Coco, a cocker, was abandoned at a boarding kennel virtually blind and with horrible skin. Working with Mutts' vets, **Coco's** amazing adopters restored her sight with surgery and she's under a dermatologist's care.



Dixon was truly pathetic when brought in as a stray -- emaciated, weighing only 33 of his now 47 pounds, anemic, with a heavy load of heartworms, hookworms, ticks and fleas and positive for lyme *and* ehrlichia. Dixon's then and now photos tell his story so much better than can any words. He's loving life now and ready to find his home.



We could see from her shelter photo that **Roxy** had severe hematomas in both ears, which had to be agonizing. What we didn't know was that she also has congestive heart failure. We almost lost her on three occasions while the vets adjusted her heart meds. Our tough little cookie is now doing well in her loving foster home.



Serious illness and resulting financial collapse left **Kiko's** owner homeless. **Kiko**, now 8+ and with him since a pup, was mistreated by others along their rough road. **Kiko's** devoted owner heroically turned him over to Mutts to protect him from further abuse.



Guilty of hanging around someone's home in rural VA, sweet **Sid** was taken to a high-kill shelter. Mutts' routine pre-neuter blood work led to a finding of a mass on his liver. We had it removed and were thrilled to learn it was benign. He's fine.



Skipper, an unneutered male, was found by a good Samaritan on a rural camping trip. Unable to find an owner, his rescuer brought him back to Fairfax where he tested positive for heartworm and two tick-borne diseases. An owner was eventually found but didn't want the expense of treating him. Score another for Mutts!
